This Bread & This Cup



Draw a picture of Thanksgiving dinner. What foods go on the table? Draw them. (If you like, you can write about Thanksgiving instead.)




What else is on the table? Are there plates and glasses? Are there candles or flowers or napkins? Draw those things, too.

What people gather for Thanksgiving dinner? Draw them around the table.




The word "Eucharist" comes from a Greek word in the Bible. It means giving thanks.
